

## **DESIGN AND ACCESS STATEMENT**

### **USE**

The situation of the site is such that it is within our land, close to the existing business. It will not affect anyone else as it is not near to any other dwelling. Although visible from the A515, it is part of our land and so close to the house that it looks like part of the house and land as opposed to anything extra. The site is in walking distance of Buxton or can be reached by bus if required. There is no other animal farm of this type in the near area and it would be a desirable facility for the area. Our guests (B&B and camping) regularly go into the field to look at our pets – there is so much interest in them and people ask to hold the animals. We feel that we need to formalise the animal contact. With an official petting farm we could charge for entry and therefore have staff which would make a better situation. Local people could enjoy this facility as it would be a good family outdoor activity.

Local use would be good. Buxton is a growing tourist centre (Tourist info centre). Our animal farm would provide local jobs and further visitor attraction for the locality.

We would be supporting the LEA's environment initiatives. Our attraction is set outside. We are already enhancing our land with planting, sustaining and developing our 6 acres to encourage wildlife, plant growth and improvement of natural habitats. We would also be supporting tourism in the area and supporting Derbyshire's active Derbyshire plan, providing a quality outdoor recreational activity that would enhance people's lives by providing a quality outdoor activity/hobby as well as sustainable development.

### **AMOUNT**

The field for development is 2 acres. (Total land is 6 acres - caravan park/wood is 3 acres; house sits on 1 acre; field is 2 acres). The field already has our pets on it in smaller sectioned off field areas (see photo). We would use these and develop the area further as per the plan. We have a lot of visitors who stay on site. This year we have had 1500 people stay for B&B and approx. the same for camping. We have had therefore 3000 people staying. A large proportion of these go to look at the animals. We also have some people who come for a day visit, either to have a meal, visit the café or visit a friend who is staying here. There is plenty of room for the visitors, we would just need some extra parking which is indicated on the plan for the people specifically visiting the animals. (The B&B people park on the courtyard and campers park next to their tents/caravans.)

### **LAYOUT**

The layout has been planned to allow easy access to all of the animal enclosures, both for visitors and cleaning out purposes. We have also put some recreational activities that are all laid out together to keep them in one place.

Huts and shelters are set in line with the fencing/walls. The whole farm has been planned to complement the shape of the house having been designed in the same line. A picnic area has been designed but enclosed away from the animals for safety reasons. The biggest field area is at the back so that any possible view from the road would be of the field rather than the smaller areas. Paths have been designed wide and straight to allow easy access. The ground is level at all parts. The entrance is wider to allow easy access. Taps have been designed near the entrance to encourage hand washing on leaving the field.



## SCALE

We propose:

1 stable for donkeys. Ideally this would be 12x24x10feet.

1 stable for the alpacas. 12x12x10 feet.

Additionally it would be good to have an indoor hut for the rabbits: 12x12x10 feet

An indoor handling area for guinea pigs: 24x12x10 feet

Stables/huts would all be constructed of wood and be of the same design & shape. Stained with wood preservative to give natural look and blend in with the surrounding trees.

We propose also: smaller huts for the goats: 2 huts at 4x6x8 in the same design as the stables.

Fencing to be made of round and half round posts with 3 horizontal bars. 4 foot high. Natural wood.

## LANDSCAPING

Pathways as indicated on the plan to be laid 1.5m wide and composed of hoggin to provide accessible route for all. Level ground all the way with seating – benches with backrests and arms set at the side of the path. Picnic area to have natural wood picnic benches.

Planting of trees at appropriate points, in keeping with surroundings. Possible shielding from road (take advice from planners). Plants to provide sensory enjoyment in the oblong sections near the donkey field gate. Land to be kept as grass; paths to be of hoggin with flexible edging. Hardstanding areas for animals to be made of paving slabs. All areas to be maintained in good clean condition. Lighting to be put along pathways – small solar powered lights (12" high). Bird boxes and food to encourage wildlife. Good tree management to encourage biodiversity and wildlife.

## APPEARANCE

The aim is to keep the farm looking natural and neat. Natural wood would blend in with the trees that are to the left. Hay bales would be used to section off the play areas. benches and huts put in line with walls and constructed of the same wood. Use of brown and greens where any colour needed. Fences all the same to provide a blended natural look from afar and near. Play area to be based on the floor with shrubs to shield it from view. Hay bales around toy tractor rides with hoggin floor.

## ACCESS

The area is all flat and accessible to able bodied and disabled persons. Sinks have been planned low to provide access for all. Wide, straight pathways for accessibility for all. Parking on the courtyard is available for disabled people. Clear signage will indicate parking and entrance ways. Emergency service access is through the gate and there is clear marking of evacuation area in case of emergency. There are buses available to us from Buxton Centre and many buses go to Buxton from all areas of the country. We would enhance the environment around us, attempt to sustain local animal breeds and provide facilities for local disabled people.

Our visitors are very keen for this to go ahead. We are often asked if they can go and see/hold the animals. If this were an official animal farm we would have the income/staff to enforce the necessary health and safety issues. We have consulted various local documents (peak district figures and nation park figures). The Peak district has 8.4 million visitors a year (national parks.gov.uk). According to peakdistrict.gov.uk ('Why do people visit?' and 'What do people do?') we would be providing for visitors requirements.
