

Appendix 2: Census Returns and Trade Directories

Below are selected census returns for Mill Street (**Site 18**) and Yorkshire Street, formerly known as Yorkshire Row (**Site 22**). For Mill Street, the 1871, 1891 and 1911 census returns are listed but as Yorkshire Street did not exist by 1911, only 1871 and 1891 are listed below. For each entry, the house number, name of occupant, their age, their employment and place of birth were recorded for this exercise.

Mill Street

In the 1851 Census, Mill Street was indistinguishable from the wider Milltown area therefore the 1871, 1891 and 1911 returns are listed below. It should be noted that 10 Mill Street was a licensed lodging house in the 1871 census and unless the county is listed, the county of birth is Derbyshire:

Yorkshire Street

Only part of Yorkshire Street falls within the study area therefore numbers 15-23 (odd) and 10-14 (even) are the only ones recorded here. The whole street is mentioned only by name in the 1911 return, suggesting that although the street still existed, the houses no longer stood.
