Planning consultation: Proposed outline for residential development (250 units). – Additional Information

Location: Land off Long Lane, Chapel-en-le-Frith SK23 0TQ

Thank you for your consultation on the above dated 09 June 2015 which was received by Natural England on 09 June 2015.

Natural England is a non-departmental public body. Our statutory purpose is to ensure that the natural environment is conserved, enhanced, and managed for the benefit of present and future generations, thereby contributing to sustainable development.

The Wildlife and Countryside Act (as amended) 1981;

No objection – with conditions

This application is in close proximity to Combs Reservoir Site of Special Scientific Interest (SSSI). However, given the nature and scale of this proposal, Natural England is satisfied that there is not likely to be an adverse effect on this site as a result of the proposal being carried out in strict accordance with the details of the application as submitted. We therefore advise your authority that this SSSI does not represent a constraint in determining this application. Should the details of this application change, Natural England draws your attention to Section 28(1) of the *Wildlife and Countryside Act 1981* (as amended), requiring your authority to re-consult Natural England.

Conditions

- **A Construction Management Plan should be approved prior to any development, including suitable mitigation measures to protect the SSSI against incidents of pollution, spill and sediment run-off while construction works are taking place.**
- **A surface water drainage scheme, including provision of SUDS, should be designed and implemented as part of the development to provide adequate treatment and control of surface water discharge in order to protect the SSSI.**
- **Water monitoring scheme to be undertaken to ensure the above measures are effective for a minimum period of 3 years. A baseline to be set through sampling of the water course where it passes through the proposed development site and where it enters Combs Reservoir to determine water quality before construction takes place. Local Planning Authority to be provided with data.**

These conditions are required to ensure that the development, as submitted, will not impact upon the features of special interest for which Combs Reservoir SSSI is notified.

If your Authority is minded to grant consent for this application without the conditions recommended above, we refer you to Section 28(1) (6) of the *Wildlife and Countryside Act 1981* (as amended), specifically the duty placed upon your authority, requiring that your Authority;

- Provide notice to Natural England of the permission, and of its terms, the notice to include a statement of how (if at all) your authority has taken account of Natural England's advice; and
- Shall not grant a permission which would allow the operations to start before the end of a period of 21 days beginning with the date of that notice.

Withdrawal of objection

The withdrawal of Natural England's objection to this application does not necessarily mean that all natural environment issues have been adequately addressed, but that we are satisfied that the specific issues that we have raised in previous correspondence relating to this development has been met. Natural England, as stated in previous correspondence, is not in a position to give a view on issues such as local sites, local landscape character or the impacts of the development on species or habitats of biodiversity importance in a local context.

As we advised in our previous correspondence, your authority should seek advice from the appropriate local record centre, Local Site scheme and other appropriate recording bodies to ensure that any decision made relating to this application is compliant with relevant national planning policies. You should also assess whether the proposal respects and, where possible, enhances local distinctiveness and be guided by your Authority's landscape character assessment where available, and the policies protecting landscape character in your local plan or development framework when determining the application.

Other advice

We would expect the Local Planning Authority (LPA) to assess and consider the other possible impacts resulting from this proposal on the following when determining this application:

- local sites (biodiversity and geodiversity);
- local landscape character; and
- local or national biodiversity priority habitats and species.

Natural England does not hold locally specific information relating to the above. These remain material considerations in the determination of this planning application and we recommend that you seek further information from the appropriate bodies (which may include the local records centre, your local wildlife trust, local geoconservation group or other recording society and a local landscape characterisation document) in order to ensure the LPA has sufficient information to fully understand the impact of the proposal before it determines the application. Protected Species

We have not assessed this application and associated documents for impacts on protected species.

Natural England has published Standing Advice on protected species. The Standing Advice includes a habitat decision tree which provides advice to planners on deciding if there is a 'reasonable likelihood' of protected species being present. It also provides detailed advice on the protected species most often affected by development, including flow charts for individual species to enable an assessment to be made of a protected species survey and mitigation strategy.

You should apply our Standing Advice to this application as it is a material consideration in the determination of applications in the same way as any individual response received from Natural England following consultation.

The Standing Advice should not be treated as giving any indication or providing any assurance in respect of European Protected Species (EPS) that the proposed development is unlikely to affect the EPS present on the site; nor should it be interpreted as meaning that Natural England has reached any views as to whether a licence may be granted.

Biodiversity enhancements

This application may provide opportunities to incorporate features into the design which are beneficial to wildlife, such as the incorporation of roosting opportunities for bats or the installation of bird nest boxes. The authority should consider securing measures to enhance the biodiversity of the site from the applicant, if it is minded to grant permission for this application. This is in accordance with Paragraph 118 of the NPPF. Additionally, we would draw your attention to Section 40 of the Natural Environment and Rural Communities Act (2006) which states that *'Every public authority must, in exercising its functions, have regard, so far as is consistent with the proper exercise of those functions, to the purpose of conserving biodiversity'*. Section 40(3) of the same Act also states that *'conserving biodiversity includes, in relation to a living organism or type of habitat, restoring or enhancing a population or habitat'*.
