Planning consultation: Proposed erection of 17 no. dwelling comprised of 3 detached house, 2 semi-detached houses & 12 terraced houses (in 3 blocks of 4 houses each) together with the construction of an access road to Combs Lane **Location:** Land at Combs Lane, Chapel en le Frith

Thank you for your consultation on the above dated 04 November 2015 which was received by Natural England on 04 November 2015.

Natural England is a non-departmental public body. Our statutory purpose is to ensure that the natural environment is conserved, enhanced, and managed for the benefit of present and future generations, thereby contributing to sustainable development.

Wildlife and Countryside Act 1981 (as amended)

Objection until further information provided

There is insufficient information to enable Natural England to provide a substantive response to this consultation as required under the Town and Country Planning (Development Management Procedure) (England) Order 2015 . Please provide the information listed below and reconsult Natural England. Please note that you are required to provide a further 21 day period for us to respond

This application is in close proximity to Combs Reservoir Site of Special Scientific Interest (SSSI). Natural England objects to this development on the grounds that the application, as submitted, contains insufficient information within the planning application documents to determine no significant impact on the SSSI through water quality impacts from the drainage scheme (from both foul drainage and surface drainage).

Natural England advises that additional information on the drainage scheme for the development is provided, as impacts on the overall water quality in the reservoir could adversely affect the notified features of Combs Reservoir SSSI. This additional information should also include appropriate mitigation against potential pollution impacts associated with the development, both during the construction process and the operational period of use.

Should the application change, or if the applicant submits further information relating to the impact of this proposal on the SSSI aimed at reducing the damage likely to be caused, Natural England will be happy to consider it, and amend our position as appropriate.

If your Authority is minded to grant consent for this application contrary to the advice relating to Combs Reservoir SSSI contained in this letter, we refer you to Section 28I (6) of the *Wildlife and*



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Countryside Act 1981 (as amended), specifically the duty placed upon your authority, requiring that your Authority;

- Provide notice to Natural England of the permission, and of its terms, the notice to include a statement of how (if at all) your authority has taken account of Natural England's advice, and
- Shall not grant a permission which would allow the operations to start before the end of a period of 21 days beginning with the date of that notice.

Other advice

We would expect the Local Planning Authority (LPA) to assess and consider the other possible impacts resulting from this proposal on the following when determining this application:

- local sites (biodiversity and geodiversity)
- local landscape character
- local or national biodiversity priority habitats and species.

Natural England does not hold locally specific information relating to the above. These remain material considerations in the determination of this planning application and we recommend that you seek further information from the appropriate bodies (which may include the local records centre, your local wildlife trust, local geoconservation group or other recording society and a local landscape characterisation document) in order to ensure the LPA has sufficient information to fully understand the impact of the proposal before it determines the application. A more comprehensive list of local groups can be found at Wildlife and Countryside link.

Landscape - No comment – Advise consultation with the Peak District National Park Authority

Natural England has assessed this application. From the information available Natural England is unable to advise on the potential significance of impacts on the Peak District National Park. We therefore advise you to seek the advice of the landscape specialists within the Peak District National Park Authority. Their knowledge of the location and wider landscape setting of the development should help to confirm whether or not it would impact significantly on the purposes of the National Park designation. They will also be able advise on whether the development accords with the aims and policies set out in the National Park management plan.

Protected Species

We have not assessed this application and associated documents for impacts on protected species.

Natural England has published <u>Standing Advice</u> on protected species. The Standing Advice includes a habitat decision tree which provides advice to planners on deciding if there is a 'reasonable likelihood' of protected species being present. It also provides detailed advice on the protected species most often affected by development, including flow charts for individual species to enable an assessment to be made of a protected species survey and mitigation strategy.

You should apply our Standing Advice to this application as it is a material consideration in the determination of applications in the same way as any individual response received from Natural England following consultation.

The Standing Advice should not be treated as giving any indication or providing any assurance in respect of European Protected Species (EPS) that the proposed development is unlikely to affect the EPS present on the site; nor should it be interpreted as meaning that Natural England has reached any views as to whether a licence may be granted.

Biodiversity enhancements



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This application may provide opportunities to incorporate features into the design which are beneficial to wildlife, such as the incorporation of roosting opportunities for bats or the installation of bird nest boxes. The authority should consider securing measures to enhance the biodiversity of the site from the applicant, if it is minded to grant permission for this application. This is in accordance with Paragraph 118 of the NPPF. Additionally, we would draw your attention to Section 40 of the Natural Environment and Rural Communities Act (2006) which states that '*Every public authority must, in exercising its functions, have regard, so far as is consistent with the proper exercise of those functions, to the purpose of conserving biodiversity*'. Section 40(3) of the same Act also states that 'conserving biodiversity includes, in relation to a living organism or type of habitat, restoring or enhancing a population or habitat'.
